Over time individual dies become easier to recognise, thanks to little flaws and quirks of the design.

RR only 18 others recorded $£ 650$ Dubnovellaunos had a long-serving diecutter in Essex, with a simple, consistent graphic style, and whose literacy steadily develops over time, as he sounded out the king's long name in the Roman alphabet whose phonetics never really suited the Celtic languages. We seldom see a silver unit's lettering as clearly this (he got his N the right way round this time, writing backwards as he had to on the die), and we know from another example struck from this same die that he was still spelling -vallaunos with an -A- in the local pronunciation. This

dates it early in the king's tenure in Essex; the scribe then switched to a standard Romano-Gaulish spelling with E [see Sills $D K$ p. 588 for details]. Dubnovellaunos' abundant silver units (this obverse die was worked until it split) match the simple style and format of his gold (ABC 2389), all of which stress his responsibility, as sacral king, for his people's wellbeing and the fertility of their lands and livestock. This shows on the units as solar imagery on both dies in the form of a bright flower, and the three-branched sacred emblem above the mare made to suggest a flowering plant or someone saluting the Sun (cf. arrangement on the half unit, ABC 2401 , where the mare even turns to face it). And then there is that enigmatic obverse. We see a realistic portrait on a bronze unit (ABC 2404, by which time our scribe was using the II form of E), and it seems Dubnovellaunos actually had rather a large nose. Are we to meant to picture the king himself in the face of that potent deity who made the meadows bloom in summer so that they could fill their ships with produce for export to Gaul?

It seems to have provided the inspiration for a North Thames bronze (ABC 2318) which bears a remarkably similar serpent. Scheers has described this curious reverse creature as a duck, while L.-P. Delestrée prefers to call it a limbless horse. These attempts to describe the indescribable are not necessarily mutually exclusive, and it's possible that to the Ambiani too it could be duck, a serpent and a horse. It could actually be an Insular coin on an Ambiani model, struck over here by people recruiting or trading or fleeing for their lives. Hence the reversed image: different mint? Only more examples will tell us.

He says: "If a notional date c.AD 1 is taken for the start of Cunobelinus' coinage, and the Agr gold and silver was struck a third of the way through his reign, this takes us close to the accession of Tiberius in AD 14...Other scenarios are plausible for Agr, not least that he was being groomed as a potential successor for Cunobelinus and was allowed to strike coinage while the king was engaged elsewhere on a military campaign or an internal diplomatic mission" ( $D K, \mathrm{p} .758$ ). This is the second Agr Bitch unit we've had that was found in Kent. The first (CR 28, 1997, no.185) came from Woodnesborough, Kent.

Pitane (modern Candarli, NW Turkey) was a small coastal town on the Elaitic gulf, north west of Pergamon.
