Dancers dressed as horses, wearing spurs. Aylesford bucket, Kent, c. 75-25 BC.

Celtic god 'dancing' r, bigeyed spiky-haired head turned back, holding serpent to his mouth with his r, hand, holding neck torc in his l, hand, and with another neck torc strapped to his waist, beaded border./ Contorted horse standing r, with open-mouthed head turned back, spiky mane and double-stranded tail. LT 9396, BMC 524-528, Scheers/GB p.506-508, pl. 13, no.348. Gd VF, lightly toned silver, great spiky haired man, intriguing design. Ex John Urban collection, bt. The Tanzendes Männlein type is well loved by most collectors

because it has such a dynamically animated design which, to our modern eyes, looks almost comical in its characterisation of the fast-moving figure and backward-looking horse. The man is referred to as 'dancing', but he could of course be running. We believe that he is dancing and that his dance is an enactment of some druidic religious ritual or Celtic myth that was probably well known to the people who would have handled this coin. The same ritual or myth must surely be featured on the Pig-Tailed Dancer potins of the Remi, LT 8124, 8133, 8143. The horse is dancing too, turning with the Sun - and what is more, the arrangement of its rump and hind legs suggest this may not be an actual horse, but a sacred dance performed by two people clad in a horse costume, making it seem to shake its head and dance - just as depicted more explicitly on the famous Aylesford (Kent) bucket.

RRRR only five others with this obverse £500 Dr John Sills says: "This is the first of the British P quarters where it really does look like something else, the recognisable figure of a soldier with a tunic fastened at the waist wearing a cap or helmet and with arms held aloft. If it is it has to be this way up, which is the opposite way to the standard form Gallo-Belgic D and its Kentish copies with their central tree-like motif are always illustrated." (pers.comm. 4.6.2025).

So the A on this lovely quarter stater may stand for Atrebates.

In his definitive review of South Ferriby staters Dr John Sills writes: "The South Ferriby series at Mint B opens with Derek Allen's N type, ABC 1737, which has a Ferriby forked hairbar combined with a late North East Coast reverse, with a rosette below the horse (*Fig.8*). The last obverse die links with several reverses that have a star in place of a



rosette and define the start of the South Ferriby type proper" (*Chris Rudd List* 118, July 2011, p.2-4).

GAULISH CAST POTIN UNITS

These were commonly used in Gaul (modern-day France and neighbouring regions) during the Iron Age and early Roman period. They are made of an alloy called potin, which is primarily copper, tin, and lead and they were typically cast (the molten metal was poured into moulds, rather than struck). Different tribes and regions within Gaul produced their own unique types of potin units, often with characteristic designs and features.

SENONES

Celtic tribe of Gallia Celtica in north-east central France. Their name, which means 'the ancients' or 'the sages', survives in Senonais and Sens (Roman Agedincum, the capital) on river Yonne, 32 miles NNW of Auxerre.

The Leuci ('bright ones') were from between the Moselle and the Meuse in northeast France. Their capital was Tulum (modern Toul).
